This year marked the fifth annual cookout, which took place over May 23 and May 24. Crews from HEMS, Allina, North Memorial, Minneapolis Police, Minneapolis Fire, Hennepin County Sheriff, HCMC and several other agencies all stopped by to enjoy the meal. The catering staff estimates they served over **2,000** people with **80** pounds of ribs, **75** pounds of salmon, **650** hamburgers, **480** pounds of hot dogs and **80** pounds of potato salad.

## EMS Week: Honoring our past, forging our future

This week marks the 50th anniversary of EMS Week, a time to celebrate the emergency professionals in our community. The theme this year is honoring our past, forging our future. Here at Hennepin Emergency Medical Services - the EMS provider for 13 suburban communities and Minneapolis this is the foundation of all that we do.

We started out as a horse and buggy service in 1894. Today, Hennepin EMS is one of the top EMS organizations in the

country, and our rigs are equipped with everything from ultrasound devices that can detect a pulmo-

nary embolism in seconds to state-of-the-art heart monitors.

Our professionals have also grown in their skills and expertise. As a fully staffed EMS service, we are a rarity, and our education department completes more than 1,000 hours of training per month. Our team of EMTs, paramedics and dispatchers are regularly called on to speak at conferences, teach classes, and share their insights in leading publications.

Being at the top of our

field is translating to real results for our communities. Recent Out of Hospital Cardiac Arrest Survival rates with bystander assistance show ours are one of the best in the nation at 65%, compared to a national average of 36%.

Our heritage of innovation is rich, and we're not slowing down anytime soon. We're always looking for ways to improve our services and better serve our community.

One example is our Basic Life Support Program, which we launched last

summer. This program allows two EMTs to respond to low acuity (nonlife-threatening) calls, instead of requiring paramedics to do so. It's an efficient way to ensure we're sending medical professionals appropriate for the level of care required by the patient - the right resource at the right time.

In addition to programs like this, we're pioneering new initiatives to create a sustainablestaffingmodel; continuing to invest in topof-the-line technologies to improve patient survival

rates; routinely training fellow first responders on the latest treatments and techniques; routinely implementing the new, proven-effective patient protocols; and so much more.

In our field, if you're not moving forward, you're moving backward, and here at Hennepin EMS, we refuse to sit still. As your EMS provider, you can expect us to continue delivering on our promise to provide the best-in-class service - just as we always have - for years to come.

Chief Scheerer's column was published in the **Sun newspapers** last week for EMS Week. In his column, he discusses where HEMS has been and some of the exciting programs we've implemented to make the future bright for EMS.

EMS Physicians Dr. Nick Simpson, MD and Dr. Tim Kummer, MD were also interviewed for a **Star Tribune** article discussing the move away from utilizing handcuffs when treating violent patients. All Hennepin EMS staff are currently participating in training to utilize alternative methods to deescalating situations and keeping crews safe.

On Saturday, May 18, Hennepin EMS Education participated in the return of a favorite event: the Teddy Bear Clinic at HHS. About 475 kids come through with their "teddy bears," accompanied by 425 adults. The HEMS team offered tours of our ambulances and hosted a CPR station.



HEMS leaders were out and about this month speaking at various meetings and conferences. EMS Physician Dr. Tim Kummer, MD, spoke at the Minneapolis Rotary sharing his perspectives and expertise related to Opioid Use Disorder. Hennepin EMS Chief Medical Director Dr. Nick Simpson, MD, spoke with Hennepin EMS Chief Martin Scheerer at the Tonka Bay City Council about patient care and call response time. Chief Scheerer also recently spoke in Deephaven and St. Anthony Village. And, Battalion Chief Tyler Lupkes (center in photo) was recently in Washington D.C. for the annual NFL Security Conference, where he spoke on EMS best practices. Chief Lupkes represents the NFC North on the Fire/EMS Committee, which develops best practices for fire, EMS, HAZMAT, and emergency preparedness at all 30 NFL stadiums.



The 8th annual EMS Pathways Academy started on March 25th. Pathways is a unique partnership between the Minneapolis Fire Department (MFD) and Hennepin EMS. Individuals can apply for a Pathways internship through the City of Minneapolis and, if hired, will receive an hourly wage while earning their EMT certification plus certification costs are covered by the program. We've had multiple Pathways graduates join the Hennepin EMS team since it started in 2016, including in our trainee program and our Communication Center!

This year's class is comprised of 20 individuals from diverse backgrounds. On Friday, May 24, we worked with the Minneapolis Fire Department to



host a job fair for the students with 12 different fire, EMS and hospital agencies. Students had the chance to learn about the wide range of opportunities available to them after graduation.





We are starting the process of adding nano-ceramiccoated window film to our ambulances and support vehicles in our fleet. This new tint will provide better UV protection for our teams while keeping the cab cooler in the summer months. It's a small change stemming from a staff suggestion that should make a great difference in the comfort of our crews and patients. Building and maintaining our top-of-the-line fleet continues to be a priority for HEMS.



A HEMS crew recently responded to a fire department in our PSA to help a staff member suffering an allergic reaction. The fire chief sent over this special note in appreciation of our crew's response:



[Our staff member] was having an allergic reaction to food and was having trouble breathing, vomiting, and fainting along with a rash and throat swelling. She was very anxious and scared. As you can imagine when you have to respond to one of your own everyone gets worked up but they were cool and collected. I certainly appreciated the excellent professional care and I know our team [...] was extremely pleased with the highest level of care [for our staff member].
