


Photo of Hurricane Milton in the Gulf of Mexico taken by NASA Johnson

While Minnesota isn't in the direct path of hurricanes, we can still be impacted by the devastation they leave in their paths. Most recently, Hurricane Helene significantly reduced our supply of intravenous fluids as our supplier was impacted by the storm.

Thankfully, we have the unique benefit of having an EMS pharmacist on staff who can help us navigate these shortages and ensure our patient care does not suffer as a result. EMS Pharmacist Dr. Holly Drone started with us last year and has been a huge asset to our team, not only assisting us with shortages, but also as a go-to resource for EMS professionals in the field, offering advice on everything from logistics like crash-safe storage and dosage best practices, to helping identify efficient and cost-effective strategies for prehospital settings.

With the IV shortage, Dr. Drone helped us find ways to strategically conserve our IV fluid supply, use lower-volume doses, and identify how to reserve IV fluids for patients who need it most.

While we've experienced some challenges due to the particularly powerful hurricane season this year, we recognize it doesn't compare to what our fellow first responders are facing in Florida, South Carolina, North Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, and Virginia. Our thoughts are with these real-life heroes as they help their communities recover from the devastation.

All of the patients were from Ecuador and



didn't speak any English. Hetchler was able to talk to the patients in Spanish, quickly sort out what happened and triage care accordingly.

"When you arrive on a scene, people are having a really bad day," said Hetchler. "Having people receive care in their own language is very helpful – it can help a person feel calmer and at ease. Making them feel heard and feel seen is important. That's good medicine."


HEMS IN THE NEWS
