

Earlier this month, Chief Martin Scheerer collaborated with St. Louis Park Fire Department (SLPFD) during its hiring process as they search for an Alternative Response Paramedic. Hennepin EMS is excited to work closely with SLPFD in launching this innovative program. The selected paramedic will focus on primary Community Paramedic work, while also responding to 911 EMS calls within St. Louis Park.

Hennepin Healthcare and Hennepin EMS are looking forward to welcoming EMS professionals from around the state for the 18th Annual EMS Update Conference. The one-day conference will take place on February 18, in-person at Minnetonka Fire Department as well as virtually. Topics range from airway management to whole blood with ALS.





Our very own EMS Pharmacist Dr. Holly Drone appeared on the **EMS Research podcast** to share more about her role in prehospital medicine and how other agencies can implement an EMS pharmacy program. Holly also shared about some of her recent research on the prehospital use of Buprenorphine for acute opioid withdrawal, Methylene Blue for sodium nitrite overdose and Risperidone for agitation. Johnny Gravermoen is an EMT/EMD who spent 21 years – "half my life" – at Hennepin Healthcare before bringing his skills to HEMS dispatch center. This year, Johnny played a critical role in managing the response to the shooting in South Minneapolis that killed Minneapolis Police Officer Jamal Mitchell in the line of duty. That shift, Johnny handled more than 60 ambulances on the board – HEMS and mutual aid partners – that were responding to the shooting and other 911 calls, ensuring seamless communication and coordination.

While working in dispatch can be stressful, what has kept Johnny in it for the last two decades is that he feels like he is making a real difference.

"You're getting to be a kind human and speak calm into what is usually a person's worst day ever."



This winter, you'll find our HEMS Event Medicine Team at sporting events across Hennepin County, including home games for the Minnesota Timberwolves. We're also supporting large crowd events at the University of Minnesota including some Gopher games.

Several HEMS team members gave presentations at the Arrowhead EMS Conference in Duluth this month. We also brought along the newest member to our fleet – rig #424 with all the latest technology and trimmings, including our new exterior graphics. More than 600 EMS professionals attended the conference and had the chance to see rig #424 up close and receive a copy of our prehospital care information.

HEMS rig #424 was also featured by Everest Emergency Vehicles, an authorized dealer of Road Rescue, at WEMSA 2025 – the premier EMS conference in Wisconsin. Everest showcased our rig at the three-day event that took place at Resch Expo in Green Bay.
